

# About the college

Galsi Mahavidyalaya, a coeducational general degree college situated in the heart of Galsi, Purba Bardhaman, has grown significantly since its humble beginning on 15<sup>th</sup> June 2007 with 129 students in a building provided by Galsi High School. With unwavering support from local well-wishers—who contributed land and resources—the college soon relocated to its own/present campus. Founded to extend higher education to economically disadvantaged rural youth—particularly those unable to access distant institutions—the college is dedicated to fostering intellectual growth, holistic student development, and socially responsive engagement, with a particular focus on the empowerment of young women. Its dedication to maintaining high standards in teaching and administration has been recognized through the attainment of NAAC accreditation with a Grade B in 2024. Further affirming its quality management and environmental responsibility, the college is proudly certified under ISO 9001:2015 and ISO 14001:2015 standards.

The college came under the grant-in-aid scheme of the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal, in 2007–08 and received permanent affiliation from the University of Burdwan in 2008–09. It was recognized under Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956 in July 2016. Since its inception, the institution has steadily advanced through the committed efforts of its faculty, staff, students, and the local community. Currently, the college is supported by eleven permanent teachers (including the Principal), twenty-two Government-approved State Aided College Teachers (SACT), and thirteen support staff (including temporary staff). Academic offerings began in 2007 with general courses in five Arts subjects—Bengali, English, History, Political Science, and Sanskrit. Honours in History and English were introduced in 2008–09, followed by Honours in Bengali, Sanskrit, Philosophy, and Political Science in subsequent years.

In line with NEP 2020, Galsi Mahavidyalaya offers a 3-year Undergraduate Degree Programme with majors in Bengali, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, Philosophy, and Geography, along with a 4-year Honours Programme in six major subjects: Bengali, English, Sanskrit, History, Political Science, and Philosophy.

Galsi Mahavidyalaya boasts a lush green and clean campus with 60% open space including a tranquil water body, offering a serene and eco-friendly learning environment. The college provides free Wi-Fi for all students and staff, a partially digitized library managed through the KOHA system, and largely online student services. It hosts a vibrant calendar of events including national and international seminars, cultural programs, cultural competitions, Freshers' Welcome, departmental exhibitions, annual functions, educational tours, sports meets, indoor and outdoor games. Students have consistently excelled in inter-college competitions organized by the University of Burdwan. Two active NSS units promote community engagement and social responsibility. The college has also established collaborations with other institutions, industries, and NGOs to support faculty and student exchange, research, skill development, and employability-focused training.

Majority of the students come from agrarian families, and as a co-educational institution, it has played a pivotal role in advancing higher education—particularly for girls—from the rural heartland of Galsi. Students consistently perform well in university examinations. The college facilitates access to government and non-government scholarships, offers tuition fee waivers for deserving students, and supports educational loans through the West Bengal Government's Student Credit Card scheme. The college takes pride in maintaining itself as a ragging free institute.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to Dr. J. B. Medda, the former Inspector of Colleges (University of Burdwan), the Headmaster and staff of Galsi High School, public representatives, local authorities, the Rice Mill Owners' Association, land donors, and the Higher Education Directorate for their invaluable support in establishing and developing Galsi Mahavidyalaya. We are especially thankful to the local community for their unwavering commitment and generous contributions. ## FACILITIES PROVIDED TO OUR STUDENTS

#### 1. Library:

The college library has been upgraded to a cloud based digital library. It offers a rich collection of books, journals, and study materials. Study room of the library provides a calm and resourceful space for the faculties and students to read, learn, and conduct research.

#### 2. Common Room:

Separate common rooms for boys and girls equipped with basic facilities and indoor games, offering a place to relax, refresh, and engage in light activities.

#### 3. NSS Unit:

The two NSS units actively involve the students in various outreach programs, such as health camps, cleanliness drives, and awareness rallies, fostering social responsibility and leadership.

#### 4. Pure Drinking Water:

Clean and purified cold drinking water is available throughout the campus to ensure the well-being and safety of students and staff.

#### 5. Magazine:

The college magazine '**Pratyus**' provides a platform for the students to express their creativity and academic thoughts through articles, poems, artwork, and departmental updates.

#### 6. Games & Sports:

Sports and physical education are integral part of campus life. The college promotes participation in intra-college tournaments / competitions, inter-college tournaments/ competitions, indoor and outdoor games and organizes annual sports to encourage teamwork and fitness.

#### 7. Concession:

Fee concessions are provided to eligible students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds on the basis of the policy document for scholarships and freeshipsto ensure that financial challenges do not hinder their education.

#### 8. Parking:

Adequate parking space is available for bicycles and two-wheelers, ensuring safe and convenient commuting for students and faculty members.

#### 9. Canteen:

A hygienic and affordable canteen operates on campus, offering snacks and meals to meet the nutritional needs of students during college hours.

#### 10. I-Card & Library Card:

Every student is issued an Identity Card for campus identification and a Library Card to access borrowing facilities, ensuring smooth academic and administrative functioning.

#### 11. Project Works:

Students are encouraged to undertake projects and participate in academic discussions under the guidance of faculty members, enhancing their critical thinking skills.

#### 12. Seminar & Exhibition:

Regular seminars, exhibitions, and workshops are organized to provide exposure beyond the classroom and promote academic excellence and creative expression.

#### 13. Scholarships:

Various government and institutional scholarships are available to support meritorious and underprivileged students in continuing their education.

#### 14. Sick Room:

A sick room with first-aid facilities is available on campus to address the immediate medical needs of the students during college hours. It also has the facility of Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine.

#### STUDENT SUPPORT SYSTEMS

Internal Complaints Committee (ICC): The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) in a college handles complaints related to harassment, discrimination, or any form of misconduct within the institution. It ensures a safe and respectful environment for all students, staff, and faculty. Our college has an Internal Complaints Committee constituted according to UGC Notification (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal of Sexual Harassment of women employees and students in higher educational Institutions Regulations, 2015) to prevent and take appropriate action against sexual harassment in the institution.

Anti Ragging Cell: The Anti-Ragging Cell in a college is responsible for preventing and addressing incidents of ragging, which includes any form of harassment, bullying, or intimidation of new students by their seniors. It typically works to create awareness, enforce anti-ragging policies, and provide support to victims. Ragging is strictly prohibited in Galsi Mahavidyalaya, Burdwan as per UGC Regulations on curbing the menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009 (under section26(1)(g) of the UGCAct1956).

Grievance Redressal Cell: The Grievance Redressal Cell of our college handles complaints and grievances from students regarding various issues such as academic matters, administrative concerns, or personal disputes. It serves as a platform for resolving conflicts and ensuring fairness and transparency in the institution. Students may register their complaints / grievances / suggestions (if any) physically in the college 'Grievance Box' or can register the same online through the college website.

#### **CODE OF CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE FOR STUDENTS:**

- Students should maintain discipline in the campus and their conduct should be satisfactory.
- Students are expected to attend the lectures regularly as per the time table of the college.
- Students should wear identity card or carry gate pass issued at the time of admission during college hours, including in examination and in all college functions and activities. The students may be required to produce their identity cards whenever required.
- Students are expected to maintain a minimum attendance of 75% in all the subjects so as to be deemed eligible to appear at the examinations.
- Students are expected to read all the notices displayed on the notice-boards as well as visit the college website regularly. Though the departments maintain WhatsApp Group but the college doesn't have any.
- Students are expected to show mark of respect to the Principal, teachers, staff and their peers.
- Students should not unnecessarily loiter in the corridors during class hours. Creating disturbance of any sort to hinder teaching and learning is strictly prohibited.
- Students should not indulge themselves in practicing ragging within the premises.
- Students should not indulge in taking any sorts of drugs as well as alcohol and tobacco in the institute premises.
- No society or association should be formed by the students in the institute and no outsider should be invited to address a gathering without the prior permission of the Principal.
- Students should take proper care of the property of the institute. Any damage done to the property of the institute or disfiguring them is a punishable offence.
- Students should maintain the cleanliness and eco-friendly, plastic free environment of the campus and should not spit or throw garbage in places other than those meant for it.
- Students should not resort to any kind of unfair means during the examinations.
- Students should avail Library facilities by obeying all rules and regulations of the facility.
- Students should maintain cordiality and indiscriminateness while interacting with their peer.
- Students are expected not to be engaged in any disruptive and discriminatory activities of any kind including inviting outsiders to enter the campus without knowledge of the Principal and the Faculty. Defiance may lead to strict punitive measures even to rustication.
- Students are strictly prohibited to engage themselves in unauthorized fund raising of any sort.
- Students should not consume food and beverages outside the Canteen. Littering the campus is liable to attract punitive measures.
- Students are expected to imbibe a spirit of belonging and appreciation during the years of their stay in the Institution.

#### **ALERTS FOR THE STUDENTS:**

- Smoking, chewing of tobacco or use of intoxicating items in any form within the college campus is strictly prohibited.
- Use of mobile phones in the corridor or in the classroom for any purpose other than academic is strictly prohibited.
- Interacting with media representatives on behalf of the college or inviting media personnel within the campus without the permission of the college authority is prohibited.
- Making audio or video records of class lectures or actions of other students, teachers and staff within the campus is prohibited.
- Providing audio or video clippings of any activity held within the campus to media or outsiders without permission of the college authority is strictly prohibited.
- Posting of derogative comments about other inmates of the college on social media platforms or indulging in any such related activities having grave ramification on the reputation of college is strictly prohibited.
- In the event of a complaint against any student for a possible breach of code
  of conduct, the disciplinary committee of the college will investigate the
  matter and recommend possible disciplinary action against the alleged
  student.
